CURRICULUM FRAMEWORK POLICY

PURPOSE

The purpose of this framework is to outline Patterson Lakes Primary School's organisation, implementation and review of curriculum and teaching practices and to ensure that, taken as a whole, all eight learning areas of the Victorian Curriculum F-10 are substantially addressed, unless an exemption applies.

The framework shows, at a high level, how the school will deliver its curriculum, how the curriculum and teaching practice will be reviewed, how we assess student learning, how we record and monitor student performance, and when and how we report to parents.

This curriculum framework should be read alongside our whole school, curriculum area, year level and unit/lesson curriculum plans.

OVERVIEW

Patterson Lakes Primary School provides all students with a planned and structured curriculum to equip them with the knowledge, skills and attributes needed to complete their schooling and to make a successful transition from school to work, training, or further education.

Patterson Lakes Primary School is committed to offering a comprehensive curriculum based on the <u>Victorian Curriculum F-10</u>. The key points in this framework, and in line with the <u>F-10 Revised Curriculum Planning and Reporting Guidelines</u>, are a commitment to:

- A defined curriculum content is the basis for student learning
- Curriculum planning that is based on two-year bands of schooling rather than each year level
- Developing and publishing a separate whole-school curriculum plan that documents our teaching and learning program
- Reporting student learning against the achievement standards in the curriculum
- Reporting student learning to students and parents in line with the Department's Reporting Student Achievement and Progress Foundation to 10 policy.
- Complying with Departmental policies relating to curriculum provision, including:
 - Physical and Sport Education Delivery Outcomes
 - Sexuality and Consent Education
 - Holocaust Education Delivery Requirements

Patterson Lakes Primary School is committed to providing a safe, supportive and inclusive environment for all students, staff and members of our community. Our school recognises the importance of the partnership between our school and parents and carers to support student learning, engagement and wellbeing. We share a commitment to, and a responsibility for, creating an inclusive and safe school environment for our students.

The programs and teaching at Patterson Lakes Primary School support and promote the principles and practice of Australian democracy, including a commitment to:

- elected government
- the rule of law
- equal rights for all before the law
- freedom of religion
- · freedom of speech and association
- the values of openness and tolerance.

IMPLEMENTATION

Patterson Lakes Primary School implements its curriculum within a weekly timetable incorporating:

- English
- Mathematics
- STEAM Science and Technologies
- STEAM The Arts Visual Arts and Performing Arts
- Languages
- Health and Physical Education
- Humanities

At Patterson Lakes Primary School, class time is structured into a weekly timetable, with 5 hours of learning per day, broken into 6 x 50-minute sessions.

Further information on how our school implements the curriculum, including the learning areas provided at each year level/band of schooling, and the capabilities that are developed by students across these learning areas and the approximate time allocations for each learning area, is provided in our whole school, curriculum area, year level and unit / lesson curriculum plans.

Professional Learning Teams (PLT) ensure scope and sequence and curriculum coverage is monitored across the school. The PLT are currently responsible for core curriculum development and delivery in literacy, numeracy and integrated studies including history, design technology, sustainability, and digital technologies. Specialist programs from Foundation to Year 6 are delivered for Physical Education, Visual and the Performing Arts. Language (Spanish) is STEAM. Supportive curriculum initiatives and programs include EAL and Literacy intervention.

Professional Learning Communities (PLC) focuses on data and curriculum. The school also has two Learning Specialists who have a focus on data and curriculum. The School Improvement Team consists of the leadership team (Principal, Assistant Principal and Leading Teacher), Learning Specialists and the Instructional Model Mentor. This team focuses on literacy, numeracy, digital technologies, sustainable schools, access (welfare), assessment and reporting, and personalised learning, including student voice and agency.

Language provision

Patterson Lakes Primary School will deliver Spanish as a Language, based on historical teaching resourcing.

Pedagogy

The pedagogical approach at Patterson Lakes Primary School is based on the Curiosity and Powerful Learning Design linked with the High Impact Teaching Strategies.

A strong understanding of curriculum is built when staff work collaboratively to consider units of work, differentiate lessons, and develop assessments. Effective curriculum and assessment teams offer staff time for reflection and support teachers to develop plans that are developmentally differentiated and meet the learning needs of individual students.

Assessment

Patterson Lakes Primary School assesses student progress in line with the Department's <u>Assessment of Student Achievement and Progress Foundation to 10</u> policy.

Students at Patterson Lakes Primary School will have multiple and varied opportunities to demonstrate learning and achievement. Teachers use assessment tasks that cover multiple curriculum levels to ensure that evidence of learning and growth is captured for every student.

At Patterson Lakes Primary School, Assessment is an ongoing process of gathering, analysing and interpreting evidence of student achievement and progress, and reflecting on findings. Effective teachers use student assessment results to evaluate the impact of their teaching on student learning, and then adapt their practices to better meet the needs of all students.

- Teachers at Patterson Lakes Primary School use a combination of formative assessment for learning (to focus feedback and guide future learning) and summative assessment of learning (to determine what the student has learned at the end of a sequence of learning), alongside student self-assessment and reflection.
- Assessment is used in an ongoing way, to guide future lessons and learning, as well as to keep students and parents informed of student progress.
- Teachers will use a variety of assessment strategies to gather evidence about student achievement. The agreed
 assessment processes and tasks are documented in the Subject Unit Designs and Learning Sequences. The
 assessments may include, but are not limited to, tests and assignments, projects, portfolios, performances,
 discussions or student-teacher conferences.
- Assessment tasks are developed to support students to show their knowledge, skills and understandings and will include clear instructions, relevant supporting documents (scaffolds, planning documents, etc.) and allow sufficient time for completion. Teachers will make modifications to the task to cater for students with additional learning needs.

- Patterson Lakes Primary School will develop Individual Education Plans (IEPs) for students who are part of the
 Disabilities and Inclusions Program, Koorie students and students in 'Out of Home' care, in consultation with
 students, parents and where appropriate, with outside agencies.
- Teachers will assess the achievements of students with disabilities and impairments in the context of the Victorian Curriculum and the 'Towards Foundation Level Victorian Curriculum' where applicable.
- The English language proficiency of English as Additional Language [EAL] students will be assessed using the Victorian Curriculum F-10 EAL.
- Where possible, staff will participate in cross marking of assessment tasks (moderation) involving assessment rubrics and work samples so that staff can apply consistent judgements of student progress against Victorian Curriculum Standards across the school.

Reporting

Patterson Lakes Primary School reports student progress to parents in line with the Department's <u>Reporting Student Achievement and Progress Foundation to 10</u> policy. In addition, Patterson Lakes Primary School ensures that there is continuous sharing of assessment information formally and informally with parents/carers throughout the term/semester, including through twice-annual formal reporting.

At Patterson Lakes Primary School there are four opportunities provided when reporting to parents:

Term 1: Getting to Know You Meetings/Information Sessions

Term 2: Written Semester Report

Term 3: Student Led Conferences

Term 4: Written Semester Report

Written reports are provided via Compass twice a year, in Term 2 and 4, with student achievement and progress against the Victorian Curriculum F-10 Achievement standards.

The report will be in a written format easy for parents/carers to understand and will be accessible in digital form with the option to translate text from English to another language, to cater to our school community.

- Patterson Lakes Primary School will report directly against the Victorian <u>Curriculum F-10 achievement standards</u> or, if reporting on students for whom English is an additional language, the Victorian <u>Curriculum F-10 EAL achievement standards</u>.
- Both student achievement and progress will be included in the report.
- An age-related five-point scale, where the quality of a student's achievement against what is 'expected' for students of that year level at the time of reporting, will be used for reporting against the achievement standards in English, Mathematics and Science (where applicable).
- Patterson Lakes Primary School will use either a learning goals scale or a learning dimensions scale for other areas of the curriculum.
- Opportunities will be provided for parents/carers and students to discuss the school report with teachers and/or school leaders.

CURRICULUM AND TEACHING PRACTICE REVIEW

School curriculum and teaching practice is reviewed against the <u>Framework for Improving of Student Outcomes (FISO 2.0)</u>. FISO and the FISO improvement cycle help identify focus areas for improvement and to evaluate the impact of introduced initiatives.

Review of school curriculum

In November of each school year, the School Improvement Team members will review the curriculum design for the following year.

Review of teaching practice

Patterson Lakes Primary School reviews teaching practice via:

- Professional Learning Communities, which link the learning needs of students with the professional learning and practice of teachers and provide an opportunity for teachers to collaboratively evaluate the effect of high impact teaching strategies; and
- the Performance Development cycle, which provides an opportunity to provide feedback to teaching staff on their performance to support ongoing learning and development, with a focus on how student learning can be improved through improving teaching practice.
